Dear Sir, Madam

With reference to my earlier communications with your office (11 April 2016; 12 May 2016), regarding the prosecution of Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin of the Russian Federation (signatory to Rome Statute 13 September 2000) for the murder on UK territory of Alexander Litvinenko, because, in contradiction of your own statement –

“it appears that none of these preconditions are satisfied with respect to the conduct described”,

regarding the Rome Statute (Articles 12 and 13) listed precondition, which you quote as

“(i) its jurisdiction has been accepted by the State on the territory of which the crime was committed”,

the UK became a signatory to Rome statute in July 2002, and so

I still await an appropriate response,

for Litvinenko had also been awarded UK citizenship, and VV Putin personally blocked the UK extradition request for his FSB agent Andrei Lugovoi who helped carry out the killing, according to evidence which the Metropolitan police in London described as “incontrovertible”, and instead Putin awarded him a medal, and therefore your court is the court of last resort and its function in such a circumstance is fully appropriate to its founding Statute.

The fact that the judge of the UK judicial enquiry, Sir Robert Owen, described the killing of Litvinenko in his own words as “a state sponsored assassination” should carry some weight.

Slowness in dealing with this issue may be seen as a lack of judicial impartiality and could call into question the moral integrity of your office.
